

## **DRUGS AND SOCIETY: SOCIOLOGY 335 (Focus W: Writing Intensive)**

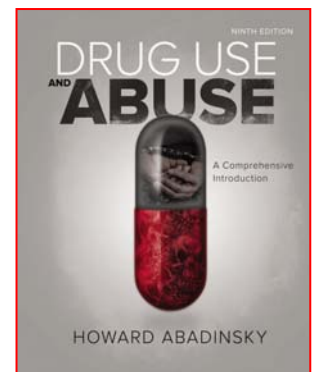
**Course Instructor:** Dr. Gordon James Knowles, Ph.D., Sociology Lecturer, University of Hawaii

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**Course Description:** *This course will examine the use of mood and mind altering drugs in America among adults, youth, and cross-culturally. Types of illicit drug cultures, psychedelics, and perception is discussed with related social norms and associated deviant behavior. This course will provide an overview of drug use in modern society in relation to addiction, substance abuse, violent crime and narco-terrorism. The course will also present the criminal justice process of sentencing drug offenders from probation to incarceration. Historical and current trends of regulating drug use as well as the sentencing and penalties for drug offenders will be discussed. The course will also examine the sociological, biological, and psychological theories of drug use, abuse, and addiction. Additional issues of criminal behavior causation as related to substance abuse, street gangs, family violence and sexual exploitation will be presented. The drug reduction and prevention strategies of police intervention techniques search and seizure, drug treatment programs, and vocational skills training will also be explored.*

**Course Text:** *Drugs Use and Abuse: A Comprehensive Introduction (Ninth Edition)* by Howard Abadinsky notes that drugs have been a part of society for as long as we can determine. The phenomena of drug use and abuse and related issues of production, distribution, and marketing will always be with us. The text focuses on both positive and negative factors related to illegal and legal drug consumption on the individual and on society as a whole. Additionally, the readings provide sociological, economical, and political perspectives that have shaped drug use in America. The text covers a wide variety of drug use and abuse: from alcohol and tobacco to crystal methamphetamine and ecstasy.



**Course Instructor:** Gordon James Knowles received his Ph.D. in Sociology with an emphasis in Criminology and Criminal Justice Research Methods from the University of Hawaii at Manoa. He also holds a Master of Science Degree in Criminal Justice with an emphasis in Police Administration and Corrections Management from Chaminade University of Honolulu. Teaching and research interests include: (1) Criminology and Urban Sociology, (2) Law and Society and Social Psychology, (3) Drugs and Society and Social Problems, (4) Criminal Investigation and Police Administration, (5) Juvenile Delinquency and Urban Gangs, and (6) Organized Crime and Sociology of Terrorism. His publications have focused on clandestine urban drug trafficking and illicit drug addiction, organized crime and underground illegal gambling casinos, prison gangs and inmate subculture, human trafficking within the sex tourism industry, counter-insurgency and anti-terrorism, the international drug trade and narco-terrorism. He serves as Military Police Lieutenant Colonel in the United States Army Reserve and supported counter-insurgency and security force development in Iraq, Indonesia, and Malaysia, conducted humanitarian assistance operations in New Caledonia, Thailand, and the Philippines, and participated in United Nations security force missions in Japan, Korea and Singapore.

**Course Outline:** Course Length: September 3rd, 2018 to December 14th, 2018.

**Course “Writing Intensive” Assignment Requirement:** Students will be required to submit a **4000 word (or about 16 pages)** research paper on a **legal** or **illegal** drug of their choice to complete the course. The course instructor will provide a sample paper and a class presentation regarding the specific details of the paper assignment on **Session 1**. This course paper is a *practical exercise* that will be evaluated based upon (1) *presentation*, (2) *correct format*, (3) *appropriate references*, and (4) *required length*. **This writing assignment will be worth 25 points towards the student’s final grade.** The writing assignment will be due on **Session 14**. **Students must adequately complete all writing assignments to pass the course with “D” grade or better. Students who do not complete all writing assignments will get a “D-” or “F” and will not earn W Focus credit.**
