Course Description

This course will focus on the nature and extent of delinquency, answering the question of what is delinquency and how does it differ from adult crimes. We will examine the theories of delinquency, primarily focusing on strain theory, social learning, labeling, and control theory.

Then we will look at some of the "causes" of delinquency, specifically the individual traits, the family factors, school factors, peer groups, gangs, and other factors. As well as examining the control and prevention of delinquency by looking at what the juvenile justice system (police, juvenile court, juvenile correctional agencies) does to control delinquency.

We will also pay special attention to the general strategies surrounding the controlling of delinquency: the "get tough" strategies of deterrence and the strategies of rehabilitation and prevention.
