Introduction:

Welcome to SOC 356 Sociology of China. This is a 10-week long online course, which runs from June 5th to August 11th in 2017.

The course will focus on the market reform era from Deng Xiaoping's governance. In post-Mao era, China has changed from a centralized socialist economy to a global market economy. China has undergone a fundamental socio-economic transformation. This course reviews social changes and movements in China after 1978. Over more than half of a century of development, China has experimented with multiple strategies with different results. The course will provide students with a review and analysis of the social, political, cultural and economic development in contemporary China.

Course Goals:

The analytic approach used in this class is mainly sociological. The main course goal is to help students to gain a good understanding of the social changes in contemporary China. Upon successful completion of the course:

1. Student will achieve a better understanding of the conditions and problems in contemporary China's society.
2. Students will be able to compare the different views and positions on social and political issues in contemporary China.
3. Students will be able to critically think about the social changes and movements in China after 1978.
4. Student will improve writing skills to express the knowledge learned.

Required Texts:

Tamara Jacka. (2013). *Contemporary China: Society and Social Change*. Cambridge University Press. (You don't need to purchase the textbook).

Requirements:

Weekly Discussion (participation in Laulima forum discussion, 6 total = 180pts=40%):

- There are 6 Discussion Questions (DQs) in this course. Each DQ is worth 30 points. There is no DQ assignment during the week when there are other assignments. Since we are not meeting face to face in class, the discussion forum is an important mode of interactions in this course. I will post discussion questions pertaining to the chapter readings for the week. Every student is then required to post their original response to the discussion forum by Friday midnight, HST, and reply to at least one other classmates' responses by Sunday, 11:59 PM HST. The reason for answering discussion questions by Friday midnight is that all students in our class should be given an opportunity to express themselves and then have some time to go over other responses and comment on those.
- The weekly discussion questions will be posted under "forum" on Laulima. First you need to construct an original post addressing the questions by clicking "Start a New Conversation." The original post is recommended to be around 200–300 words long. Later in the week, you will need to construct two response posts to comment on another two students' original posts by clicking "Reply to Initial Message." The reply to classmates' responses is recommended to be a minimum one paragraph. Your answer should not be merely opinion, but based on your understanding of the textbook reading. Use citations and references as evidence to back up your claims as needed.

- Make sure that your comments contribute to the class discussion. (You can use Private Mail for your personal conversations/social chat with classmates). Your comment or response to your classmates will be evaluated based on the quality of arguments used in it. "I agree", "Cool stuff!" remarks are not considered adequate contribution to the discussion and will not be graded. You can certainly cheer your classmates but do not expect to receive any points for participation based solely on those "Way to go!" type postings. When you post messages online, follow the basic principles of netiquette -rules for communication online. (The Core Rules of Netiquette are located on the web site <http://www.albion.com/netiquette/corerules.html>)

Assignments (3 total = 150pts):

- There will be three homework assignments throughout the semester. Each assignment is 50 points. All three assignments are worth 33% of your total grade.

Term Paper (120pts = 27%):

- Identify a current topic or issue and develop a research question(s) (**due week 3**). You need to write a paragraph to address your topic. Instructor will provide feedback for the topic by the end of week 3. The topic submission is 20 points.
- The paper shall address a question raised by the textbook, weekly discussions, or documentary posted on Laulima.
- Complete a term paper around 6~8 pages long, double spaced (**due week 10**). The term paper is 120 points.

Extra credits: There will be extra credit opportunities announced by the instructor online. Each student can earn up to extra 5 points (5%) for their final grade.
